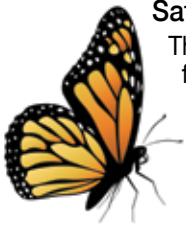
Monarch Magic

The Wild Bees that Live in your Backyard: You can Make a Difference

Imagine creating farm workers tinier than a grain of rice who would travel from flower to flower, pollinating plants, fueled only with tiny sips of a sugary drink. Imagine each year creating trillions of them. Too late, nature has already created them, they're called "bees." Did you know that in Maryland there are over 400 species, that they provide no honey, pollinate our crops, live underground, most never sting, never cause allergic reactions, are declining, that it takes only 5 flowers worth of pollen and nectar to create a new bee, that you can help reverse these declines, and that mowing kills more bees than pesticides? If you didn't know those things you should join us for more details of these critical insects.

4000 Years of Women in Science:

The History of Women in Science, Technology and other Wonderful Stuff

Astronomy at the Top of the World

Jim O'Leary was among nine astronomy educators chosen from across the U.S. to travel to Chile and visit the remote astronomy observatories there, meeting with astronomers and astronomy educators as part of the Astronomy in Chile Educator Ambassador Program.

Jim's talk will explore the geography of the Chilean Andes which makes them ideal for astronomy featuring the U.S. supported observatories located there. The talk will also include images of the gems of the southern sky - the Southern Cross, the Magellanic Clouds and the center of the Milky Way high overhead.
